Dr. Clarice Yentsch, author of "The Woman Scientist: Meeting the Challenges for a Successful Career," has spent her professional life pursuing marine research and education that promotes systems thinking, sustainability and stewardship. Clarice is the co-founder of the Bigelow Laboratories for Ocean Sciences, and worked there as a research scientist for nearly 20 years, investigating marine optical properties, dinoflagellate ecology, and flow cytometry. She has had a second career in education and outreach, focusing on teacher professional development, curriculum development and systemic reform, as well as collaborations with a number of national museums. Clarice earned her Master's degree from Univ. of Wisconsin, and her Ph.D. from Nova Southeastern University, where she is currently a research scientist and adjunct professor. She is president of the Waypoint Foundation, a non-profit organization to promote and celebrate human creativity by providing an environment conducive to observations, creative works, learning, sharing and collaborations.
