Founded in 1971, and located in Woods Hole since 1975, the Sea Education Association (SEA) has been a leader in marine education, developing an understanding of the importance of the ocean and of its powerful role in seemingly every aspect of our lives—whether we live on, near, or at great distances from the shore. The idea is to give students the opportunity to study the ocean from a multitude of academic perspectives and to do it from the platform of a traditional sailing vessel, therefore combining a rare blend of theoretical learning and the application of such knowledge. Coursework for students from any academic discipline involves the studying of maritime policy, history, and literature in addition to ship navigation and oceanography. They learn about the ocean's power and mystery, use scientific technology to study it, and design research projects that will be the focus of their work at sea.

Since its founding, SEA has equipped students with the tools to become environmentally literate leaders prepared to address the defining issue of the twenty-first century: the human impact on the environment. Their fully accredited study abroad program, SEA Semester®, is the leading off-campus Environmental Studies program focused on the ocean. SEA Semester was developed in direct collaboration and affiliation with Boston University. Over time, SEA has sailed with nearly 8,000 students studying abroad for a summer or semester from more than 300 colleges, and is formally affiliated with more than 40 colleges/universities nationwide. SEA also offers programs for high school students and teachers, and for students in the MIT/WHOI graduate program.

The SEA sailing vessels—134-foot brigantines—operate year-round. The SSV *Corwith Cramer* sails the waters of the North Atlantic, Mediterranean, and the Caribbean Sea, while the SSV *Robert C. Seamans* sails the waters of the Northern and Southern Pacific.

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Our mission is to explore and understand the ocean and to educate scientists, students, decision-makers, and the public.

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
