Dr. Joseph J. Seneca

Joseph J. Seneca is University Professor of Economics at the Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning & Public Policy. He is the author of over 150 articles, reports, and books on economic policy, public finance, environmental economics, and state economic development. He has taught at all levels of instruction throughout his career at Rutgers and has received numerous awards for exemplary teaching and contributions to public service. From 1991 to 2003 he served as Rutgers University's Vice President for Academic Affairs and as chief academic officer was responsible for all academic programs on the New Brunswick Campus. He directly supervised the deans of the 11 degree granting schools. He also was responsible for 15 research centers with direct reports to him, as well as the University Libraries. From many years he served as Chairman of the New Jersey Council of Economic Advisors, a non-partisan advisory body to the Governor and Legislature. He received the 2002 Educator of the Year Award from the Research and Development Council of New Jersey. He is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where he received his undergraduate and graduate degrees.
