Vicky Cullen, President Board of Directors By Mavise Crocker

The evolution of Neighborhood Falmouth has been the story of the right people with the right ideas and talents, arriving on the scene at the right time. It has been a slow process, but —as with an interesting jigsaw puzzle—as each piece falls into place, the picture becomes clearer.

Vicky Cullen is one of the "right" people who has helped Neighborhood Falmouth thrive and grow. Paul Smith, whose initial idea became the basis of NF, served as president in its early stages, but in the spring of 2008, Vicky became president, bringing with her the background and expertise needed to help make NF a viable organization.

For over thirty years, Vicky served WHOI in many different capacities, from editor of its newsletter and *Oceanus* magazine to Communications Director. She was also Director of WHOI's 75th Anniversary Activities, celebrated in 2005.

Perhaps one of the projects that was the most fulfilling for Vicky was the time she spent in 2004-05 writing and compiling *Down to the Sea for Science*, a I84-page history of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. It was the first professional account of WHOI's 75 years of ocean research and a major asset to its 75th year celebration.

In preparation for this extremely active, successful career, Vicky received her BA in political science and English from the University of Nebraska, and her MSJ in journalism from Northwestern University. A true daughter of the Midwest, she grew up in a Nebraska town about the size of Falmouth. She spent five years living in Europe with her first husband, Mel Briscoe, before they moved to Woods Hole. She later married John Waterbury, now WHOI Scientist Emeritus in microbiology. The two Waterbury sons, Andrew and Matthew, are both in graduate school.

After retiring from WHOI at the end of 2005, Vicky turned her energy to freelance writing and editing, the latter mostly for *Oceano-graphy* magazine. She also has time now to indulge in non-business hobbies and to become involved community activities. In her own words, she says, "I serve on the board of the Woods Hole Public Library, grow a few dahlias, and love the fiber arts of all kinds, as well as making bead jewelry." She authored a history of the Woods Hole Library published in 2008.

However, it is with the Neighborhood Falmouth organization that Vicky is now most deeply involved. Soon after her retirement from WHOI she attended her first NF meeting, realizing how important the organization could be to older citizens. She began by helping with administrative matters, including assisting Ed DeWitt as he finalized our non-profit application. We are fortunate to have Vicky serve now as our president—she certainly has been the right person with the right talents coming to NF at the right time!
