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

Arctic Sunrise

The Canadian icebreaker Louis S. St-Laurent negotiates thick ice near the Beaufort Gyre, the swirling heart of the Arctic Ocean. The rhythms of this vast circulation system may have been disrupted by global warming. The Gyre has been accumulating great amount of fresh water during the past decade. If this fresh water leaks into the North Atlantic, climate pattern in north America, Europe, and beyond could be affected. As part of the Beaufort Gyre Exploration Program, WHOI scientists, in collaboration with researchers from Fisheries and Oceans Canada, are using instruments to measure changes in the amount of fresh water swirling under the icepack from year to year. 
