

WHOI Assists in Finding El Faro Voyage Data Recorder



WHOI's coastal research vessel <u>R/V Tioga</u> (left) and a U.S. Coast Guard vessel were among the flotilla that also included two fireboats from neighboring towns escorting <u>R/V Neil Armstrong</u> as it arrived in <u>Woods Hole</u> for the first time on April 6. The <u>238-foot Armstrong</u> is the newest and most advanced ship in the U.S. academic research fleet and is operated by WHOI for use by the oceanographic community. In welcoming the ship and its crew, many of whom served on the <u>R/V Knorr</u>, home to Woods Hole, WHOI President and Director Mark Abbott said: "While it's true a ship in port is safe, that's not what ships are built for. 
